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TIMOTHY GEORGE COMMITTEE ON DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION REPORT

The first meeting of the committee was held in August 2021 to begin discussions of our charge and path forward to implement the vision of the Executive Committee, which chose to address the timely and critical issues of diversity and inclusion in our field. As an indication of the importance, the Executive Committee has assigned this endeavor. The Committee was named in honor of our sadly departed member, friend and role model, Timothy George, MD.

The initial membership of the committee consists of 18 energetic men and women from across the country, all of whom have interesting life experiences to shape the discussions and action plans. As the committee gets more focused on its initial action plan, additional members will be recruited. Volunteers are always welcome.

Our initial focus will center on the following:

- **1.** Awards/recognition for research papers/presentations that address disparity/access/inclusion.
- **2.** The development of pediatric neurosurgical educational materials that are socially and culturally acceptable to all.
- 3. Outreach projects to young students (grammar school, high school, college, medical students). Develop outreach projects directed to young students (high school and college) as well as to medical students via organized focus groups (or subcommittees) for each demographic. Partner with existing organizations with outreach programs (e.g. "Mentoring in Medicine" in New York City and "PausePartnerships" in Atlanta).
- **4.** Outreach projects in host cities/universities. Host outreach projects in the host city of the Section meetings with coordination of the meeting organizing committee.
- 5. Identification of barriers to access for students/applicants to neurosurgery Al's, residencies and fellowships. Identify barriers to access for students/applicants to neurosurgery Al's, residencies, fellowships. Interface with Neurosurgery program chairs and program directors to search for real or perceived biases against applicants to neurosurgery and to pediatric neurosurgery in particular, among other topics.
- **6.** Identification of those pediatric neurosurgeons who would be willing to volunteer as AANS Mentors with special interests in disparity, equality, inclusion and outreach.
- **7.** Invite members to review the <u>AAMC Diversity 3.0 Learning Series</u>, AAMC Diversity Toolkit or Racial Equity Tools, anti-bias training and education.

SENIOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

The AANS/CNS Pediatric Section Senior Advisory Committee was formed in order to provide liaisons to committee chairs and co-chairs from among the ranks of experienced Pediatric Section members in case a "historical perspective" might be of use when committees are faced with decisions, new ideas or questions. To this end, Drs. Alan Cohen and Tina Duhaime assembled a Senior Advisory Committee made up of seven senior liaisons to the Education, International Relations, Diversity and Inclusion, Research, Quality Improvement, Trainees and Guidelines Committees, including, respectively, Tad Tomita, Rick Boop, Laurie Ackerman, John Kestle, Bruce Kaufman, Jeff Wisoff, and Ann Flannery for each of these named committees. Every senior member asked agreed to participate as a liaison, and several committees and/or their subcommittee members already have availed themselves of this perspective, which may be helpful when a proposed plan or approach has been tried in the past but met predictable hurdles that might be helpful to circumvent in the early planning phases of an initiative.

The Senior Advisory Committee looks forward to working with many of the committees and subcommittees whenever we may be able to serve as sounding boards, "memory banks" relevant to past Section efforts or general non-binding advisors.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As we weather the ups and downs of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pediatric Section remains in good financial health. Total net assets as per the last (6/30/2021) financial statement totaled \$1,282,747. This is a slight increase from the prior year (\$1,015,842) and continues to reflect a comfortable reserve to support an entire annual meeting plus Section activities for around two years without any revenue. In order to continue to support research grants and manage extra reserves in a manner consistent with the Section's mission, opportunities for new partnerships are being explored.

Annual Meeting

The COVID-19 pandemic and recent Delta variant numbers have required strategic planning for the upcoming meeting. At this time, the Section is moving forward with an in-person meeting primarily with select portions to be live-streamed. As such, the expense for the 2021 Annual Meeting for the AANS/CNS Joint Section in Pediatric Neurological Surgery is estimated at \$328,304. Abstract submission numbers were strong, but it remains too early to project financials for the meeting at this time. The Section recognizes the current uncertainty about travel and anticipates loss of revenue for the in-person meeting may be recouped from the virtual component.

Long-term Investments

The Section's long-term investment account did exceptionally well in fiscal year 2020 with a gain of \$229,381 for a total of \$1,063,400. This is an increase from last year at \$834,018. The Section's long-term investments are handled via a pooled investment portfolio with the other sections, which allows the sections to get into funds not otherwise available to smaller investors.

Honor Your Mentor Funds

As of June 30, 2021, the A. Leland Albright fund has accumulated \$50,917 and after dispersement of \$28,600, has a remaining balance of \$35,829. The Sanjiv Bhatia fund has accumulated \$62,431 and has not yet had any dispersements. The Marion "Jack" Walker fund has accumulated \$25,057, also without any dispersements.

Specific Expenses and Financial Resolutions

Although the FY2022 budget is still in process and has not yet been finalized, the Section plans to continue its commitment toward its educational and research missions including the Section research awards, the pediatric Neurosurgery Research & Education Foundation (NREF) fellowship grant and domestic and international traveling fellowships. A partnership with the CNS Foundation may represent an opportunity for additional growth, as will the transition to annual meeting management by the CNS. The Section is grateful for the prior help and management from the AANS team.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Webinars and Lectures Subcommittee has created a two-year educational curriculum starting in January 2021 consisting of an every-other-month virtual conference on an online platform featuring a 30-minute educational talk by an invited guest lecturer followed by a 30-minute case presentation/Q&A session hosted by a panel of junior faculty, fellows and residents. The vision for this subcommittee will be to provide quality pediatric neurosurgical educational content to fellows, residents and other learners through an online virtual format. The 12 topics covered over the two-year curriculum were chosen to represent broad pediatric neurosurgical curriculum. The host centers have volunteered to participate and were assigned topics in a random fashion to prevent any institutional bias. The host center is responsible for moderating the session, inviting the guest faculty and providing one panelist (junior faculty member, fellow or resident). The other two panelists will be selected by the subcommittee. This will ensure a balanced representation of speakers throughout the two-year lecture series. Links to the virtual conference as well as a link to sign up as a volunteer host center for the educational curriculum can be found on the Pediatric Section website. Our most recent webinar has featured Dr. Boop talking about supratentorial tumors, which was organized and lead by the University of Alabama.

An exciting new product will come from the podcast subcommittee. This subcommittee is in the process monthly podcasts covering topics in pediatric neurosurgery with invited experts. The first proposed topic is a historical perspective of the specialty, and the planned invited guests are Drs. Michael Scott and Marion Walker. Future podcasts will explore management controversies, emerging research in the field and career development, among others. We plan on having our first one out by the Section meeting and are hopeful that the first few adequately capture the history of our profession.

The planning for the 2021 Annual Meeting continues. In the era of uncertainty, the National Meetings Subcommittee helped shunt abstracts slated for presentation at the AANS to the Section, which were evaluated according to the standard process for the annual meeting. Final preparations are forthcoming. We are excited to see everyone in Salt Lake City for the meeting.

A robust examinations committee continues to do its work and is primarily managing the CNS SANS Section on Pediatrics. The co-chairs Dr. Governale and Dr. Morgenstern are also preparing questions that are taken directly from the released stems from the American Board of Neurological Surgery. The 12 members of this committee are all contributing material for this important endeavor. Several of the other subcommittees including the Hands-on Workshop Subcommittee and Pediatric Specialties Committee will become more active once the Section meeting is held. Last, we are also figuring out ways to partner with the ASPN Education Committee to put forth joint endeavors that enhance the educational footprint for our profession. This has been an exciting year, and we look forward to many more activities in the upcoming year.

AAP/SONS REPORT

As my two-year tenure as Chair of SONS draws to a close at our next EC meeting, I am inspired by all that we have accomplished together in a short period of time.

- Adapted to the challenges of a global pandemic and helped in the planning of a first-of-its-kind virtual AANS/CNS Section on Pediatric Neurological Surgery annual meeting
- Produced robust educational content for our pediatric colleagues at the annual AAP NCE, through the new AAP POC platform, and in publications such as Pediatric Clinics of North America and AAP News
- Provided input for important advocacy issues such as pediatric brain death criteria, insurance reimbursement for experimental diagnostic modalities for concussion, access to critical surgical services, child abuse and gender-based harassment in the workplace
- Involved in international health matters through the Section on Global Health
- Participated in the AAP's Choosing Wisely campaign with recommendations for pediatric neurosurgical patients and unnecessary imaging
- Gave advanced practice providers on pediatric neurosurgical teams a voice in the Section
- Allowed more opportunities for our membership to get involved in SONS initiatives such as the AAP Subspecialty Access to Care Working Group
- Grew the membership roster by 50% from two years ago
- Re-purposed the SONS business meeting at the Annual Meeting of the AANS/CNS Section on Pediatric Neurological Surgery to a "mini-scientific" meeting focused on advocacy, outcomes research, quality and safety efforts, and racial and socioeconomic disparities in pediatric neurosurgery

Future directions of SONS may include a focus on diversity and inclusion in pediatric neurosurgery by engaging women and minorities in training to consider pediatric neurosurgery as a career; formation of a pediatric neurosciences committee within the AAP to unify and coordinate the efforts of the Sections of Neurology, Neurosurgery, Physiatry, Radiology, Anesthesiology, etc.; continued push towards a national pediatric neurosurgery registry to allow for benchmarking, research and education; and a higher profile at national meetings to set SONS apart from our sister professional societies in pediatric neurosurgery. Remember what makes SONS unique is our positioning as an interface between pediatric neurosurgeons and our pediatric colleagues. Through mature advocacy and education programs, SONS has an outward-focused mission, projecting and representing the ideals of pediatric neurosurgery to the rest of the world.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Research Committee endeavors to promote the advancement of care for children with neurological disease through the promotion of scientific discovery and the development of early-stage investigators through mentorship. It will develop infrastructure to facilitate scientific advancement and the sharing of novel findings. Efforts will focus on building research foundations among early career investigators, including trainees in neurosurgery. This will allow for the development of career-long research focused pediatric neurosurgeons, who will mentor future generations of research-oriented pediatric neurosurgeons.

In this effort, the committee now includes 4 subcommittees, each with a specific focus. There is a common focus on mentorship in the research arena. The subcommittees include NREF and Pediatric Section Grants; Faculty Development and Mentoring; Clinical Networks; and Basic Science and Genetics Networks.

The NREF and Pediatric Section Grants Subcommittee is tasked with administering the current grant offerings related to the Section and the NREF, but will further look towards promoting these awards and providing mentorship and support to help applicants develop the strongest possible applications. This year, the Faculty Development and Mentoring Subcommittee will focus on developing infrastructure to support the mentorship process in pediatric neurosurgery research. This will include establishing a network of engaged and qualified mentors for both MD and APP members of the Section. This subcommittee will also develop a manual to help guide the mentorship process. The Clinical Networks Subcommittee will establish and solidify relationships between the Section and established clinical research networks that are focused in fields relevant to pediatric neurosurgery. It will begin by identifying networks of interest and establishing a liaison to each of these. Through this process, it will promote participation in the various networks and eventually develop guidelines for collaboration with various clinical research entities. The Basic Science and Genetics Networks Subcommittee has taken on the task of facilitating the communication of basic and translational research among members of the pediatric neurosurgery community. This will include work with the organizing team of the Annual Meeting to develop basic science sub-sessions within the academic program, as well as training and mentorship tools tailored toward basic researchers in pediatric neurosurgery.

The Research Committee is energetic and enthusiastic about each of these tasks. Please contact any of our members directly if you have any questions or interest in participating.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The recently created Quality Improvement Committee has been enthusiastically working to evaluate the role of quality improvement (QI) in pediatric neurosurgery. This summer, the committee sent a survey to members of the AANS/CNS Section on Pediatric Neurological Surgery, inquiring about their perception of the importance and challenges related to the implementation of QI in the field of pediatric neurosurgery. We would like to thank all of those who took the time to answer the survey. The committee will use this information to propose the key initiatives and shape future efforts around QI for the Pediatric Section.

The QI Committee has ambitious goals, which include the following:

- **1.** Evaluating and reporting on the role of OI
- **2.** Advocating for QI support/infrastructure and foster means to share resources
- **3.** Providing education on Science of Improvement & Safety for pediatric neurosurgeons
- **4.** Establishing QI standards for pediatric neurosurgery and encouraging multicenter collaboration

The QI Committee is currently working on analyzing the survey responses, which will be shared with the section during the 2021 meeting. We are also working on a "white paper" on the role of QI in pediatric neurosurgery and expect to have a final draft of the manuscript by winter 2022 as well as dedicated sessions for QI project presentations in upcoming Section meetings.

Finally, the QI Committee would like to thank the many expert volunteers willing to help with future projects, particularly Dr. Joseph Piatt, the quality officer of the Chair's Committee on Planning and Development, and Dr. Bruce Kaufman, QI Senior Advisory Committee.

GUIDELINES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Pediatric Section Guideline Committee has been active over the last six months. This committee serves many purposes. We initiate the production of practice guidelines for pediatric neurosurgeons by submitting ideas to the CNS Guidelines Committee, then creating a working group to produce the guidelines through a process supported by the CNS. We also nominate committee members to the CNS/AANS Joint Guideline Review Committee (JGRC), where we review internally and externally produced guidelines for endorsement by the CNS/AANS, a review which often serves as ad hoc peer review for publication in neurosurgery. Finally, we serve as an internal pediatric section review committee for any pediatric specific practice parameter, guideline or practice statement that might be submitted from external sources to the Section. Overall, the committee provides many services to the Section, all of which revolve around the goodwill of section membership donating time to these efforts. The defining attribute of a committee member is either a knowledge of methodology or a desire to learn the methodology through CNS sponsored methodology educational courses.

Currently, we are working on Guidelines for the Surgical Treatment of Chiari I Malformation. The process started early this year, and we hope to have a final product over the next few months. In addition, over the last six months, our members have reviewed section specific externally produced guidelines on topics such as pediatric epilepsy. JGRC members have reviewed many additional internal and external guidelines on topics such as adult tumor, adult spine and ulnar nerve decompression. Section committee members are currently helping with the SFNS Surgical Treatment of Epilepsy guidelines with the AAN/AES/CNS and the diagnosis of brain death update guidelines with AAN. As chair, I truly appreciate the many hours committee members have donated to producing and reviewing guidelines, and I look forward to continuing this work for the section in 2022. Future endeavors for our committee include updates of prior guidelines (plagiocephaly, spina bifida) and creation of a new guideline on tethered spinal cord.

THE ABPNS IS HERE TO SERVE YOU

The American Board of Pediatric Neurosurgery (ABPNS) is composed of 10-12 Pediatric Neurosurgeons with the mission "to encourage the study, improve the practice, and elevate the standards of pediatric neurological surgery, and thereby to advance the cause of public health."

It started out with forty pediatric neurosurgeons from the US and Canada, who met in Chicago in the early summer of 1991 and voted unanimously to form the Board. A year later, the Accreditation Council for Pediatric Neurosurgical Fellowships (ACPNF) was created to oversee and regulate pediatric neurosurgical fellowship programs.

The main function of the ABPNS is to certify neurosurgeons in the subspecialty of pediatric neurosurgery. While past ABPNS certificates were not recognized by the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS), the remarkable accomplishments of the ABPNS over 3 decades led to the logical next step of joining forces with the American Board of Neurological Surgery (ABNS) on one hand, and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (RCPS-C) on the other hand, to offer combined certificates, henceforth entitled: Recognition of Focused Practice in Pediatric Neurosurgery (RFP). The advantages of the new RFP include official recognition by the ABMS and maturation of the close partnerships with the neurosurgical specialty boards of the US and Canada.

Hence, as our founders predicted in 1991, the ABPNS's position as the official body for certifying pediatric neurosurgeons was formalized and has become the de facto source of information and certification matters for individuals, departments, hospitals and other societies, such as the American College of Surgeons and the American Academy of Pediatrics. We are also excited that our collaboration with the ABNS now gives our RCPS-Canada certificate holders access to the Continuous Certification process of the ABNS.

If you are not currently a member of the ABPNS, please join. If you are, please keep abreast of the dynamic changes occurring at the level of the merger with the ABPNS and RCPS-C, certification, recertification, written exam, etc. by referring to the following websites: <u>ABNS</u>, <u>ABPNS Certification</u>, <u>ABPNS Recertification</u> and <u>ACPNF</u>.

What is in the Future?

We will work on continuing to enhance our partnership with the ABNS by combining the ABNS and ABPNS websites, giving Canadians more access to ABNS-ABPNS activities and automating a centralized application process, caselog entry for certification and recertification applications.

Important Dates

- November 12-13, 2021: ABNS pediatric focused oral examination
- December 7, 2021: ABPNS BOD meeting and ABPNS oral examination
- April 1 and October 1 of every year: Deadlines for ABPNS recertification applications
- May 13, 2022: RFP examination in pediatric neurological surgery for ACPNF fellows will require in-person proctoring by an ABPNS Diplomate (usually fellowship director or designee)
